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I am delighted to bring you the Development Trust Annual Report covering 2022. Looking back over the year we have achieved a great deal. This has been helped by the Board of Management's approval of the Development Trust Strategy in September 2021 which has given us a clear focus.

The Development Office have worked hard in making a start to embed a culture of fundraising throughout the organisation and raise awareness about the fundraising work. The Development Trust has continued to keep a high profile and have been present at a number of events such as Freshers Fayre, Prize Giving and Graduation to raise awareness of the trust and its work. In March we held a Campus Tour to give businesses, and our friends and donors an insight into the range of activities we offer and at the same time raise the profile of UHI Perth in the community.

This year we have funded a whole range of initiative including the Big Project to help students with the cost of living crisis, The Community Wellness Garden addressing Health and Wellbeing and our latest project to encourage more young people to look to a career in STEM subjects.

The highlight for last year must be the opening of our Community Wellness Garden. We are so grateful to all who contributed to this project and helped up provide a tranquil space to support the wellbeing of students, staff and people in our community. This social space will provide a corner of the campus for people to think and reflect, well away from the daily pressures that exist. It will also provide a social space for a wide range of activities to address the wellbeing agenda for our Campus Community. A further benefit will provide our Horticultural students with the opportunity for work-based study, learning and employment.

To address the skills gap in STEM subjects we are keen to launch a project in STEM engagement from early years to university and employment. Currently UHI Perth deliver STEM awareness raising sessions, in an interactive, interesting, and fun mode of delivery, to P6 – S6 pupils and our aspirations are to widen this out from Nursery through to P5. This will ensure that we are instilling STEM thinking from an early age all the way through secondary school, building up their knowledge and experience of all things STEM on a yearly basis. You can read about this in more detail later in the report.



The Scholarships Programme, which has been running for many years, continue to provide great opportunities for our most aspiring students. Last year the number of scholarships increased to over 30 awards. The scholarships are donated by individuals, trusts and businesses and in many cases they include the opportunity for the students to benefit from work experience and mentoring from their benefactors. Two awards are dedicated to students from Care Experienced backgrounds and provide support to this vulnerable group. We are extremely grateful to the many local businesses and individuals who have generously supported this scheme, offering both financial help and invaluable work experience as students prepare for the future.

To generate further income we are encouraging everyone to sign up to our Easyfundraising initiative. So every time you shop online it allows you to support UHI Perth without costing a penny! If you would like to sign up, please see the details later in the Report.

Finally a huge thank you to members of the Development Trust and Development Committee, who have given their time, energy and resources voluntarily to benefit the college. 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A Celebration Week saw a number of events connecting employers and the workforce of the future and celebrating student and staff achievements from the year.

Community Jobs Fayre and Regional Employer Event

In partnership with Perth and Kinross Council (PKC) Skills and Employability Initiatives Team and DWP, UHI Perth hosted a successful Community Jobs Fayre and Regional Employer Event on Tuesday 30 May.

It served to connect employers, the workforce of the future, including students and the wider community.

Over 30 employers presented job opportunities, along with a host of guest speakers including Alison Edgar MBE, leading author and motivational speaker; and Mike Benson, Director of the Crannog Centre. Fireside sessions designed to stimulate discussions were hosted by John Ferguson, Tay Cities Clean Growth and the Regional Hospitality Forum showcasing the power of partnerships.

Peachy Creative Media held an informative workshop on the 'Power of Social Media', while all participants and visitors were impressed by a student showcase which allowed the students to demonstrate what they learn in their courses and do live demos.

In her opening remarks, Dr Margaret Cook, UHI Perth Principal and Chief Executive explained that working in partnership with employers would help grow our regional economy. Thomas Glen, Chief Executive at Perth & Kinross Council added that there was a strong ambition to enhance how young people are educated and enjoy an incredible career living and working in Perth and Kinross, along with a real drive to support children living in poverty.

Alison Edgar MBE shared her experiences working with businesses and how success can lie with employees treating their employer's business as their own, describing this as 'Intrapreneurship'. She reminded the full-capacity audience that time is our most valuable commodity and that we should embrace the rate of change.

Mike Benson shared his journey working with UHI Perth's fourth year Visual Communications and Design student Ewan Broomfield and how there was mutual benefits for both the organisation and young person to working together on the Crannog Centre rebrand after the catastrophic fire.

Following the speeches, each student was invited on stage and presented with their awards, trophies and certificates to recognise their hard work and dedication.

"Ewan brings a strong work ethic and exceptional contribution to our department. His willingness to learn and self-motivation shines through and he practices his skills and further advances his knowledge in any way he can.

"As well as helping staff with additional projects throughout the year, he has almost completed a bespoke chess board for his son that he has designed and crafted. He is a breath of fresh air, and willingly offers help and support to fellow students struggling with some of the practical elements of the course. His peers see him as a good role model and regard him in high esteem.

"Ewan's maturity brings a calmness to the class and always encourages his peers to work to a high standard. On every assessment to date, he's achieved full marks and has produced several written projects that have gone above and beyond the required criteria, showing that he puts in the time and effort required for the theoretical elements of the course. Within his employment at WB Dodds, Crieff, Ewan is very highly regarded and is already a key member of the company.

"The positive impact Ewan makes on everyone around him makes him a worthy winner of this award, as he truly is one of the most outstanding apprentices we have ever had the pleasure of working with over all our combined years of teaching Carpentry and Joinery. He is highly regarded due to his sheer dedication to the craft, passion, and determination in the pursuit of excellence in everything he tackles."

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Inspiring STEM Engagement from Early Years through to S6, creating a path from Early Years through to University.

Currently UHI Perth deliver STEM awareness-raising sessions, in an interactive, interesting and fun way to senior school pupils. Our aspirations are to widen this programme out to children from Nursery age through primary school to secondary, facilitating a STEM continuum throughout early years, primary, secondary through to tertiary education, developing young peoples' knowledge of STEM subjects.

Presently Scottish Government funds UHI Perth to deliver STEM events for senior school pupils but teaching the younger age groups are considered non-statutory and so there is little engagement with younger pupils in Scotland. By introducing young people from 3-9 years old in STEM activities which are fun, practical, inspiring and interactive we aim to plant a seed in these young and developing minds to influence them in later life when making subject choices in secondary school - and in turn guide their career path and aspirations.

It is recognised that there is a need to make STEM more engaging, fun and intrinsically linked to STEM industry and employers. This is vital to increase the uptake of STEM subjects, especially for female students, to meet the skills gap in STEM industries. Employers in this sector state that 43% of vacancies are hard to fill due to lack of skilled workforce. The core root of this growing skills gap is STEM education and therefore there is a need to introduce these subjects from a young age to better prepare the STEM talent pipeline for the future. This project aims to address these challenges and increase the learning opportunities available in STEM activities to early years learners.

Organised fun events such as the Scottish First Lego League which UHI Perth hosted in 2019 is an example of the kind of events planned for our project to help young people develop an interest in STEM subjects. It was attended by over 500 people including pupils, teachers and parents. The event was truly inspiring for many young people, developing their interest in STEM, and learning teamwork, competitive skills and encouraging innovation. These along with similar types of events will be part of our project and provide a platform for showcasing skills taught within the learning environment.

At UHI Perth we aim to be engaging and influencing, addressing equality issues in STEM education and professional learning at all levels. Our STEM roadshows also align with "Getting it right for every child" (GIRFEC) which is the Scottish Government's approach to promoting the wellbeing of children and young people.

The main aims of the project are:

- 1. To raise awareness in STEM subjects from an early age to stimulate young minds and provide foundation from which they can develop.
- Increase STEM learning in early year for children and their families to inspire and encourage them to take the subjects in secondary school and into tertiary education.
- **3.** Deliver and develop a collaborative and cocreative approach to STEM awareness and career opportunities in the future.

We aim to create a seamless, logical path from early years, through school, college and university to employment within the sector. In partnership with our schools and STEM employers, we aim to inspire and engage young people and their families to better understand STEM subject and consider a future career in this area of work. This will in turn will address the skills gap in this area raising awareness and creating fantastic opportunities in STEM careers.







The official Opening Ceremony, held on 26 October 2022 was hosted by the Development Trust at UHI Perth who are managing the Community Wellness Garden initiative.

In 2021, a crowdfunding appeal was launched in conjunction with Aviva Community Fund which raised over £4,000 to begin the project.

Distribution Director, Aviva UK GI, was invited to officially open the garden. He explained:

"I'm honoured to be asked to open this new Community Wellness Garden on behalf of Aviva and all my colleagues who chose to donate to this fantastic cause. Each year, the Aviva Community Fund supports many charities throughout the UK, demonstrating that by caring more about our communities today, we can create a better tomorrow.

The Big Project

Supporting Students through the Cost of Living Crisis.

Before Christmas, UHI Perth recognised an urgent need to help our students and members of the local community struggling to make ends meet. With the cost-of-living crisis rising, the amount of money student have to spend on essential goods has been hit greatly.

In response to this, we set up the Big Project to those in need to access essential food and toiletries with little or no stigma and provide a warm and relaxing safe space. A cosy area was created in the Academy of Sport and Wellbeing over the festive period until mid-February. We also set up food and clothes banks in the Brahan, Goodlyburn and Webster buildings on campus for anyone to take freely until the end of term in June.

Each week since the start of the project, around 500 people have benefited from the scheme, showing that there is a huge demand. John, who is a hairdressing student said: "It's discreet for everyone and very much available to all in each of our buildings, I have needed it so much over this period. Thank you so much" and Kornelia added: "It's really helpful, I love the help we are getting. It helps my family a lot too, and when we need something I can come and get it. It's really great."

Many thanks to everyone who supported this project, its been very much appreciated.

Studying at UHI Perth opens up a world of creativity and knowledge to our students interested in design, fine arts, photography, or media.

The creative sector continues as a key driver to the local and national economy, contributing richly and fundamentally to cultural identities.

Gregor is a 26-year-old artist from Perth who studied Visual Communications and Design and graduated with an honour's degree in May 2020.

When he was 17 - and in his fifth year of secondary school – he explained he was totally fed up, so visited a careers adviser who guided him towards a computing course at UHI Perth. After about three months into the course, Gregor realised that there was growing piles of drawings building up in his computing notebooks and this led him to the realisation that he probably wasn't in the right place! Having decided that the course was not right for him he found a job at a supermarket whilst deciding what he wanted to do with his life.

During the computing course, he found himself spending more time drawing and daydreaming than engaging with the learning. Despite not taking art at school, Gregor had always been into and felt a sort of pull towards creativity, which made him realise he wanted to do something expressive. Having come to this decision he took a chance and signed up for the NC Art and Design course to escape his supermarket role and found it very fulfilling. He carried this on and studied Contemporary Art Practice for a few months, then switched to Visual Communications because it seemed like a better fit for his skills at that time.

The course gave him the freedom to take projects down whatever path he chose. In third year, Gregor was lucky enough to be part of a live project for the BBC Big Weekend event and was selected as a leader for the project. They created a large

interactive installation which we then installed on site at Scone Palace. Working on this project really boosted Gregor's confidence and helped shape his perception of what is possible through creative projects.

Gregor feels that the most important thing that he gained from the Visual Communications course was increased self-confidence. He said 'I was not a very confident person upon leaving school and was quite wary of trying new things and meeting new people. The skills I gained through tackling challenges and pushing my boundaries have helped me exponentially, and although I still struggle with self-confidence now and again, I am much better equipped to handle it in a positive way because of my experiences gained through the Visual Communications course'.

Gregor continued 'One of the great things about UHI Perth is that all the lecturers are great! From my experience, everyone is treated with respect and lecturers go the extra mile to help you when you need assistance. I was consistently inspired by how knowledgeable my lecturers were regarding their field of expertise'.

Since graduating, Gregor has been busy freelancing and working on creative projects around the local area whilst maintaining a steady part time job. He also got married last April, which he describes as a 'pretty big moment in my life'!

Gregor likes to push boundaries and upon graduating, he was granted an Alumni Award from the creative department and was commissioned to create an artwork for the Community Wellness Garden on Campus. The artwork itself is a site-specific work which both reflects upon its environment and some of his own thoughts. You can see Gregor's artwork in various sites around Perth and the surrounding areas. One of his favourite pieces is at the fantastic Cullach Brewery on Princes Street. There are also the remnants of a 100m long temporary street mural on Balhousie Street in North Muirton, which was part of a big project he conducted with Sustrans at the Balhousie Primary School.

Thanks to this course, Gregor has learned so much and continues to put those lessons to use in his creative practice, as well as life in general.

Climbing Centre




